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Since the spring *Even Keel* it's been very busy about our club, with some great successes to celebrate. Firstly, our club has just turned 40! The GTYC was formed at a public meeting of 28 interested people on 5 September 1973 at the former Bell Park Technical School.

Today our membership continues to grow, and in the last month alone we have welcomed new members John and Jeanette Malpass from Ballarat, and Pam Baker from Lara. This has taken our total membership to just over 100: a wonderful milestone! (You can read more of the GTYC's history on our new website!)

Our GTYC website (www.gtyc.com.au) has also been re-designed, thanks to Jason Martin, a professional in this field, and a Castle owner (*Already Gone*). It has all the content from our previous website (originally established by Jim Bland) but has a new look, cleaner navigation, and is more accessible to those of us with 'limited' web savvy!

The new site is also much easier to update with fresh content by those responsible for the various activities offered by our club (such as racing news and results; cruising plans; and upcoming social events). This feature will help spread the workload across our committee – which will no doubt be a relief for Paul Webster, who till now had to update the lot.

We staged another successful Seniors' Sailing afternoon 6 October, just after the first Short Series Race 1 for the summer season.

Two weekends later, we officially opened the new season on 20 October. This year's opening day was enjoyed by all those who attended. Our newly acquired 6 by 3 metre gazebo extended the rotunda to accommodate the 50 or so who enjoyed a pleasant morning, followed by a BBQ. Unfortunately, the strengthening wind forced the cancellation of the planned sternchaser novelty event.

These events proved very enjoyable for those members and guests who attended with their boats, and I'd like to thank them all for their hospitality toward our new and prospective members present. We are quickly earning a reputation for running enjoyable events; we seem to be enjoying doing what we are doing; and we are making progress towards things important for the club's future.

Our clubhouse sub-committee is continuing its discussions with local politicians and councilors about funding for a new shared clubhouse (with Geelong Coast Guard), securing promises for support. Next year is a state election year, so it's very timely to get commitments from those in charge of the 'purse strings'.

Our keynote annual event, the Queenscliff to Geelong Yacht Race, was originally scheduled for 3 November, but a 'higher authority' had other ideas – sending a blast of 30 knots or more to coincide with our scheduled start. That howler continued until 6 PM that evening, and couldn't have been better timed to disrupt our race.

We therefore postponed the event until 17 November: the nearest Sunday when the incoming tide at Port Philip Heads was again acceptable. As if to make up for the first forecast, the weather two Sundays later was perfect! As a result, the race was very successful (with 19 entries, up from 11 last year) and enjoyed by all – except perhaps for a small number who were swept across the line early by the current, as our officers of the day (Mike Allden and Bob Balding) eagerly tried to get everybody started.

The race results are shown later in this edition, together with some wonderful photos by Heather Brown (thanks so much Heather!). There were not enough cruisers to register results in Division 1. At the end of the day, all of our competitors praised our volunteers for the conduct of the race, and we heard nothing but praise for the entire event. So well done everyone!

Our club also extends a great deal of gratitude to our very generous sponsors: *Harken, Club Marine* and the *Victorian Regional Channels Authority* – who have all backed this event for the third year in a row. As a result, our club at last did not lose money on the event (as we have done each in the last two years). That's wonderful news for our club, and competitive passage sailing! So all-in-all: an excellent result and one we hope to equal or better next year.

Our General Committee is still looking for volunteers to help spread the work of running our club. I'm very pleased that Brian Mahoney has offered to keep track of what is needed in the rotunda and keep it stocked; also, Barry Thompson has taken on the YV Affairs task, ensuring that those who order Silver Cards and Cat 5 stickers actually receive them. However, we're still looking for someone to check the treasurer's work at the end of the year.

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The 'Incorporated Associations Act' we must comply with says we do NOT have to have our books audited, but your committee prefers that our accounts are professionally checked each year to ensure our finances do not drift from the 'straight and narrow'.

The job involves a few hours checking the books each July, and that is all. We have established a system of keeping the books that makes it easy, and Treasurer Ray Slee (or me, as former treasurer) can help get the process started. We also need to establish a social members group to nominate and organise the social activities (including social sailing) that our social members would like to enjoy. The committee could guess at what is wanted, but it would be better if our social members had the main input on this. So if you are interested in being part of this new group, please contact me direct.

In other news, Mike Allden and I concluded the changes to our official rules io comply with the new Incorporated Associations Reform Act.

Our racing sub-committee has prepared a new GTYC calendar (running from October 2013 to September 2014), and this is included in this edition of *Even Keel*. Please note and support the many sailing and social events on offer, and feel free to suggest anything else that might appeal to our membership.

I was away on holidays during the running of this year's Arthur the Great Race on Saturday 30 November, but I understand the small but enthusiastic fleet had perfect weather to sail in, with winds from the S-SE of 5-12 knots. This made the outgoing journey a bit of a challenge, but the homeward run would have been very pleasant indeed! Many thanks to Bob Balding for organising this event!

Bob and Linda Balding have also kindly offered to stage the GTYC annual Christmas function at their Lara home on the evening of Saturday 7 December, so I hope to see as many club members there as possible, and I thank them in advance for their generosity! I will take this opportunity to wish you all a Merry Christmas, and enjoyable cruising to take us into the New Year!

Queenscliff to Geelong Yacht Race 2013

The 2013 Queenscliff to Geelong Yacht Race was sailed by a strong fleet of 20 keen boats on Sunday 17 November in almost perfect weather.

The wind varied between 5 to 15 knots from the S-SE, with generally cool but sunny conditions: ideal for sailing. In fact, the conditions fully justified the club's earlier decision to reschedule the race from 3 November, due to predicted rough weather of 30+ knots.

At the pre-race briefing at Queenscliff, GTYC Commodore John Mole warned all skippers about the effect of the incoming tide flow carrying yachts over the line before the start signal (given it was generally a downwind start).

Once out on the water, the Division 1 fleet start observed this warning very well, and there were no offenders crossing early.

Director Special was in this group as she was sailing without a spinnaker; however, the skipper had some temporary 'hearing loss' and was a full five minutes behind the rest of the fleet's start. But with a fair wind, she made very good time after that and finished only 31 minutes behind the fastest Noelex flying a spinnaker. A very commendable effort!

The Division 3 start had all the 'top guns' competing, and this race was vigorously contested with two boats crossing the line prematurely. Ironically, our esteemed commodore went very close, but did not cross before the siren.

The two offending boats were *Dream On* and *Five O'clock Somewhere*; both returned to the start, with *Dream On* dutifully going around the end buoy correctly. She then managed a fair effort to catch the leaders for the rest of the race, but the winds were a little too strong for a podium finish.

Five O'clock Somewhere also returned and crossed the line, but did not go around the end marker buoy (as required by the starting boat flying the alphabet letter I flag). Consequently, she paid the ultimate price at the other end of the race.



Bea Jay (Timpenny) held off the fleet to record fastest time and win Division 2. David Phillips in Running Free won Division 3, with only 9 minutes between the 1st and 8th place-getters.

Most competitors flew spinnakers on the trek from the Outer Harbour into Corio Bay, resulting in some colourful on-water duels as one boat crawled past another, forcing the slower boats to get the kite out again.

Even though *Restless* (skippered solo by our treasurer) was not an official entry, she put in a commendable performance, and would have scored a podium position if she had sailed with a crew. All up, a great passage racing event, capped off with some excellent trophies and prizes from our very generous sponsors: *Harken, Club Marine*, and the *Victorian Regional Channels Authority*.

And this post-script from a 'spy' aboard Vintage Red (skippered by Commodore John Mole):

At the pre-race briefing, our humble commodore John Mole warned other skippers of the danger of the incoming tide pushing boats over the starting line too early.

Ironically, he then found himself too close to the line aboard *Vintage Red*, and the flag not yet dropped. So we did a quick manoeuvre to avoid crossing early, then an about-turn when the hooter sounded and we were away.

Unfortunately, another hooter drew our attention to the recall flag: someone had crossed early. Was it us? Don't think so! But, after a few minutes, *Dream On* turned around and re-started. The flag stayed aloft. Someone else had also infringed. It could have been us, so we reluctantly tacked and made our way back against the strengthening current.

We rounded the start boat amid cries of: "What did you come back for? It was Bruce!" *Vintage Red* had given everyone a couple of miles start.

Shoosh now. Don't tell John Mole, or this is bound to attract *Mariner's Nightmare* points!



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Short Series - Race 1

A healthy fleet of seven boats fronted for the start of the club's first race of the new calendar for 2013, held on Sunday 6 October 2013. We ran two divisions with three yachts in Division1, and four yachts in Division 2. The selected course was one lap from the start line to CB2, then to CB6, and back to the finish. The wind was about 5 knots from the south.

Division 1 was led over the line by *Restless*, about 50 metres ahead of *Charisma*, with *OH LA LA* missing the start. Division 2 saw a much more competitive start with *Five O'clock Somewhere* leading *Vintage Red, Dream On* and *Beaugolais* over the line. By this time, the wind had increased to about 8 knots.

By the time the fleet reached CB2 the wind had increased to approximately 12 knots, and changed from the south to the north-west. All boats were flying spinnakers down the first leg.

Division 1 was now led by *Charisma*, having overtaken Restless and established a lead of about 150 metres, with *OH LA LA* a distant third place. Division 2 was still led by *Five O'clock Somewhere*, followed by *Dream On, Vintage Red* and *Beaugolais*.

On the second leg to CB6 the wind had freshened to a blustery strong 18–20 knots, still in the WNW, providing all boats with a challenging and fast reach. The strong wind soon proved too much for *OH LA LA*, which withdrew and headed for quieter waters.

At CB6 *Charisma* was still leading *Restless* in Division 1. Meanwhile, *Five O'clock Somewhere* had gained a commanding lead in Division 2, followed by *Vintage Red*, which had passed *Dream On* in the heavy conditions, then *Beaugolais*.

Turning for home, it was now a tacking duel in the heavy conditions, and with the wind, shifting between NW and WNW it was proving difficult to lay the finishing buoy. As the fleet got closer to the line the wind started to moderate, so that by the finish it was about 12 knots.

Charisma led Restless over the line by 3 minutes in Division 1, while in Division 2 Five O'clock Somewhere had cleared out to lead Vintage Red over the line by 4 minutes, followed by Dream On just 20 seconds further back, and Beaugolais a further 2 minutes astern.

A pilgrimage in Spain

In the last edition of *Even Keel*, I wrote that I was about to set off for a pilgrimage in Spain. I'm still not sure why I did it, but now it's over there are certainly many, many tales to tell. And over 4,500 photos to document every gruelling step of the way!

A friend and I landed in Barcelona (Spain) in early September, and soon caught a train, then a bus, to the beautiful southern French village of St Jean Pied-de-Port. The next day, 5 September, we set off on foot with hundreds of other pilgrims to climb the Pyrennes, along the same route that Napoleon took his invading armies south into Spain in the early 1800s.

It was the start of a 35 day pilgrimage that would take us through three Spanish regions stretching across the country's north, to reach the famed Christian pilgrim city of Santiago in the far west: a distance of 860kms.

As if that wasn't enough, after we received our 'pilgrims' blessing' at the glorious Santiago Cathedral, we decided to trek an extra three days to the Atlantic coast, finishing at a small village called Fisterre ('end of the earth'). That brought our total walking distance to 960kms.

And unlike others who took the 'easy option' (and had their packs sent ahead in buses and taxis), we carried our 9kg backpacks the entire way, stuffed with a few essentials (such as water, spare clothing and food).

Many of the pilgrims I met suffered some debilitating injuries to their feet, ankles, legs and hips, and everyone got blisters.

The journey was one long fellowship, with everyone searching for something different; each with their own reasons for walking, eating, socialising and sleeping among strangers.

I'm still thinking about my reasons, but I already know the rewards have been immense. *Viva Espana, y buen Camino!* Now: back to sailing!
